The Pastaza River and the many waterfalls are the headwaters of the Amazon River.

JAN 25 City Tour

Quito was declared by Unesco as the best preserved colonial city of the Americas. Discover Ecuador's history by visiting downtown Quito and studying its architecture.

JAN 26 Alambi & Sachatamia

Located on the western slopes of the Andes, Alambi and Sachatamia allow you to see hundreds of hummingbirds, and other unique species of birds, that gather in a single spot to feed. Lunch will be at Sachatamia Lodge where EcoMinga staff will give you an introduction to their conservation work, and an overview of projects at major reserves, including the nearby vanilla project at Manduriacu Reserve.

JAN 27–29 Galapagos Islands by Luxury Yacht

Fly to the Galápagos and board the Infinity Yacht, with a serene panga ride through the mangrove estuary of Black Turtle Cove on Santa Cruz Island. Explore Genovesa Island's El Barranco—Prince Philip's Steps—home to red-footed boobies, owls, and nesting petrels along a lava plateau trail. Continue to Santiago and Rabida Islands for red volcanic landscapes, sea lion colonies, flamingos, endemic cacti, and *nine* species of Darwin's finches. Lodging: Infinity Yacht (learn more about the vessel here)











JAN 30-31 Exploring Santa Cruz Island

Land-based exploration of the island's volcanic highlands, home to a massive lava tunnel and the famous Galapagos giant tortoises-still critically endangered, but recovering. Santa Cruz, the most populous island in the Galápagos, hosts three genetically distinct tortoise populations.

Javier Robayo

Javier is an award-winning conservationist and executive director of Fundación EcoMinga. He has led more than 200 research biology and teaching expeditions in Ecuador. His extensive, collaborative field work has led to the discovery of more than 10 species of orchids, a new genus containing two species of rodents, a new genus of frog, and five other species of amphibians. Expert focus: Botany, birds, and tropical biodiversity



Lou Jost

Lou, cofounder of EcoMinga, is a scientist, naturalist, and conservationist whose life's work fuses mathematics, ecology, exploration and art. Trained in physics and math in the U.S., he ultimately turned his gaze to the biodiversity of the Andes and Amazon. For three decades, he's lived in Baños, Ecuador, devoted to studying and protecting these ecosystems. His pioneering research—especially on quantifying biodiversity—has shaped global conservation science. Beyond academia, Lou has discovered over 70 plant species, mostly orchids. Through Fundación EcoMinga, he helped establish protected areas and worked hand-in-hand with local communities to shield imperiled habitats. His dedication runs deep—both personal and professional—and his legacy thrives in the forests he has preserved and the lives he has enriched through science and inspiration.



Natalia Espinoza

Natalia is an Ecuadorian-American aspiring filmmaker and polyglot with degrees in Film and Psychology from Barnard College and an M.A. in Film Studies from Columbia University. Her multicultural upbringing in Ecuador inspires her work, using film to bridge cultures and explore environmental themes. Her thesis focused on climate storytelling and ethical issues in documentary and docufiction in the Amazon. Currently based in NYC, she has become increasingly involved in conservation in Ecuador since 2020. Natalia serves on the board of the EcoMinga Foundation, is a Youth Council member of Reserva: The Youth Land Trust, and co-founded EcoStudio. She hopes to use storytelling to advocate for climate action and the protection of Ecuador's biodiversity.
